



## **Admissions - Entrance examinations at FHS UP for the Academic Year 2019/2020:**

### **Bachelor's study programmes: Physiotherapy**

#### **1. Expected term of entrance examination:**

Entrance examinations are assumed to take place between April 15 and September 6, 2019, in accordance with the terms agreed on with foreign agencies. The terms will be published on websites of both FHS UP and the individual agencies.

#### **2. Application submission:** till August 15, 2019

The application is submitted in an electronic form, applicants must pay the administration fee and download attachments proving that they meet the conditions, i.e. certificate of a complete secondary education or the study in the last year of secondary school, certificate of a language examination, respectively\*, \*\*. The original document proving the completed secondary education will be submitted on the day of the enrolment at the latest.

#### **5. Form of the entrance examination:**

Written tests from somatology and biology, natural sciences, written and oral examinations of English language proficiency\*, \*\*. To succeed an applicant must achieve the minimum points in each part of written and oral parts of the test (see the Table below). There are no bonus points for secondary school results added to written test results.

\* Native speakers present evidence that they completed education in the English language and then they do not have to sit for a written part of Round II.

\*\* In case an applicant has already passed an internationally respected language test and achieved the minimum level B1 according to CEFR: PET/FCE Cambridge exam, BULATS score 60, IELTS 5 (min 4 from each part), or TOEFL iBT – 40, they supply evidence of such examination and then they do not have to sit for a written part of Round II.

An applicant who does not have to sit for a written part of Round II (see the conditions specified above) is given maximum points to be achieved in the written part of Round II..

The resulting order of applicants is given by a sum total of points achieved in Round I and Round II, in each part of the exam the minimum points at least must be achieved. Applicants who do not achieve at least minimum number of points in Round I do not advance to Round II. Only those who succeed in the written part of Round II advance to the oral part.
